# PETER FINLAY, MBE - SUB-POSTMASTER AND FRIEND OF MENSTON



As one of Peter's countless friends and admirers I can give a no more sincere tribute than a précis

from the eulogies given at his funeral by his family.

To a church packed to overflowing his elder son John reminded us of his many lives. First and foremost, as a family man, richly enjoying to the full being husband, father and grandfather. As a Sub-Postmaster, immersed and concerned for the vulnerable, helping with their forms and memory lapses, John said "He was one of life's good people".

Peter was Chairman and later Secretary of the National Federation of Sub-Postmasters playing a key role to whom people turned when in trouble. Before emails he regularly had the entire family folding papers and stuffing envelopes. He spoke eloquently at their conferences and was regarded as an honest, caring and trustworthy representative by his peers, dropping everything when a colleague was in trouble.

Scouting too became a passion, originally involved on the basis of "an hour a week and a bit of training" which really meant a lifetime of fun of Gang Shows, Camps and adventure - giving children an experience outside school. Camp cook, van driver or washer-up, nothing was beyond or beneath him, eventually as financial guru claiming Gift Aid and providing tons of small change for County Scout Camps. Latterly he was leading on negotiations with Bradford Council to secure the Scout/Guide HQ for generations to come.

Acknowledging that she had always been affectionately known as "Peter's daughter" Jayne confessed that the family had been staggered at the number of organisations her dad had been involved in. Never the sole leader but involved in a key role with others and supported wholeheartedly by his family he helped drive change and alter lives of people in our village for the better. Jayne painted a vivid picture in the 1990s of the family going in convoy on Friday night to collect a Shipley Paint van, loading it with marquees, tables and chairs, shopping at Morrisons, Saturday afternoon fire-up the BBQ, in the evening watching Gladiators and checking profit made! Sunday was washing glasses, returning them, the marquees and the van. Life was hectic but always enjoyable. Peter's list of "something to do" went on and on:- Athletic Club,

Thespians, Youth Club, governor Menston Primary School, Chairman Menston Parish Council, Chairman Kirklands Trust, Menston Library coordinator, Remembrance Day Services, volunteer at Cornerstones and probably the most important one - to ensure that Santa drove his sleigh round the village every Christmas.

Jayne concluded by reminding everyone of Peter's mantra at every event when he shouted - "Don't forget to thank the teachers/leaders/volunteers who made this happen".

Like me, many of your readers will have worked under Peter's leadership on numerous occasions benefiting from his common sense and wide experience. This is our opportunity to thank Peter from the bottom of our hearts. An amazing man with prodigious energy and enthusiasm. It is truly amazing what he achieved "on an hour a week and a bit of training". Dale Smith

# **MENSTON PARISH COUNCIL**

It was with deep sadness that our Chairman Peter Finlay MBE passed away in February. Amongst his many community involvements, as detailed above, Peter had been a founding member of the Parish Council and now we carry forward his hard work and community visions. In the words of one of his favourite bands, the show must go on. We are now looking forward the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations, further details included in this newsletter, and an exciting time for the village to come together to meet new friends and enjoy our community with all its appeal.

The local home building in the village is progressing at pace, a warm welcome to all new residents, we look forward to meeting soon. The Parish Council has received some funding contributions arising from the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL). The idea being that local people can suggest projects that would, to some extent, mitigate the impact of development in our area. Whilst there are certain rules on what this levy can be spent on, we are calling for suggestions. The guidance says that it should be used for the "provision, improvement, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure: or anything else that is concerned with addressing the demands that development places on an area". Examples in the guidance include improvements to a village hall, new or improved play areas, provision of affordable housing, and preparation of a neighbourhood plan. Any suggestions are welcome; many worthy ideas have already been put forward. Suggestions can be submitted to the Menston Parish Clerk at menstonpc@hotmail.co.uk or alternatively by contacting any of the parish councillors.

Other news on the top of the agenda is that we are in regular communication with senior executives at the Co-operative Food HQ to lobby for re-introducing their presence in the village or failing that we are taking steps to ensure the premises will be available to other retailers. Our gratitude goes out to the local businesses who have filled the gap left by the Co-op. Please support our local services.

# ST. JOHN'S PARISH CHURCH

In the next few weeks and months, it is highly likely that our village will welcome Ukrainian refugees. Thank you to those of our community who have offered their homes in this noble and sacrificial way. For those of us who could not do so, it is now important that we seek to support those who are coming and those who host them, so that together, Menston may be a welcoming place in which healing, shelter and safety may be found.

As churches, we should be on the forefront of offering support. The Bible is littered with passages which talk about the importance of the "other", whether it is Jesus talking about loving our neighbours as ourselves, the famous verse in John where God loves the whole world so much..., or whether it's in more obscure bits earlier in the Bible. The recurrent motif of care for the vulnerable – for widows, orphans, poor or "aliens" – gives us no ground for neglecting any of those who may arrive here.

For the people of Israel, this care for the vulnerable was linked to the corporate memory of their own slavery in Egypt. Their ancestors knew what it was to be in need, and passed down this shared recollection to ensure that the people of God would never forget. They were to make space for the vulnerable; when harvesting, not going back over the field or olive grove to be sure they had picked every last item, but deliberately allowing their leavings and gleanings as provision for the poor (just one example is Deuteronomy 24).

Even in a subsistence economy, provision was to be made for the vulnerable. How much more in an affluent area like Menston. In a subsistence economy, leaving part of the harvest for other carried a cost too. We will find it costly to care for other: it takes time and energy and will cost us financially, but also in other ways. But this is our Biblical duty to the vulnerable. At the end of this month we celebrate the Queen's jubilee. The contrast between these celebrations and the events of our world is vast. However, part of what we celebrate is the Queen's tremendous lifelong service and duty, for which we thank her and thank God. In her, we have a picture of costly service of others. Perhaps, the contrast, therefore, isn't so stark after all. Our Queen is an example for us to follow.

As street parties happen, may they be both a celebration and a statement of our intent to serve others. Let us be thankful for the Queen's service, whilst remembering our own duty to the vulnerable even if it is costly. Steve Proudlove, Vicar

# CLIMATE ACTION MENSTON - CAM

We continue to support and educate people on the climate emergency and we would love more people to get involved.

On the education front, we had an excellent talk on energy from Keith Pitcher who heads up the zero carbon group for Climate Action Ilkley. They have members who have installed air source heat pumps and hearing about their experiences was really valuable. Moving away from fossil fuels has become more and more urgent for us all. Do get in touch if you would like to get involved in zero carbon issues and maybe we could start a community energy project?

Still no news on the safer crossing outside the primary school but we are working on a cycling/walking leaflet for the village to encourage short journeys to be made on foot or bike. Do we need more cycle racks in the village - let us know?

Thinking BIG for families of children with additional needs

It's been great to see some familiar and new faces join us at Kirklands Community Centre for our Learning & Development Sessions and Group Support Meetings, where we've covered a range of topics for parents & carers of children and young people with additional needs. We've also continued to meet up for walks, and share ideas and information about useful services and activities locally via our meetings, online resources and WhatsApp groups.

Bradford Special Educational Needs & Disabilities Inspection:

March was an incredibly busy and important time for our families across the Bradford district, as a long-awaited Local Area SEND Inspection by Ofsted and the Care Quality Commission got underway. The purpose of the inspection was to assess how effective our local area is at identifying, assessing and meeting needs to improve outcomes of children and young people who have special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND).

Our members took part in the inspection by sharing their views and experiences through surveys, emails and virtual meetings with inspectors, to help present an accurate picture of families' experiences, aspirations, and the improvements they would like to see in the future. At the time of submitting this article we are awaiting the final report, which we'll forward to members for discussion.

#### Saltaire Inspired:

We were delighted to be approached by Saltaire Inspired recently, who deliver annual arts events in the World Heritage village. As part of the Saltaire Arts Trail in May, Friends and Family Hub members were asked if they would like to take part in Creative Workshops, with acclaimed artist Lisa Watts and her 80 year old father Gordon. The artist and her father have first-hand experience of being carers, which inspired the event's main exhibition 'My Crazy Family Golf' – a fully playable 5-hole crazy golf course that visitors could play and interact with at Salts Mill. It was a lovely opportunity for our families to meet other people who may share similar experiences. Thank you!
